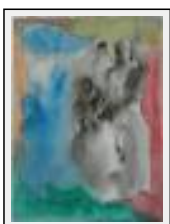

Desc. : Why do you laugh so much when you live on less than dollar a day? Well the words almost forms on one's tongue when you see this picture. But I had a better vantage point to understand this. They were playing a game of Carom on the street. Nice January Evening. I stopped there for a little bit on my way home to catch some local carom action. I couldn't especially take my eyes off one of the kids (one holding a two year old little girl in arms) who was playing his shots when it was his turn. Every now and then he would have to bend a little bit to look at the angle and how he would execute his shot on the board. Every time he did that the little baby in arm would also go down a little bit with that motion. Her gaze was transfixed on the board. I think she was more concentrated it seemed on the shot than her uncle in whose arm she was very cozily placed. Then of course with the 'customary generosity' that these slum dwellers are known for they invited me to play with them. Now that drew a little attention as now there was an Indian with long hair more interested in taking pictures than playing the game (besides I sucked at it as I haven't played in many years). They were very respectful and would often make encouraging remarks when I would have made the simplest of shots with a lots of difficulty and absolute mediocrity. At the end of the game I asked the whole group for a picture . They raised a big racket about it. They were pushing each other and horsing around. There was a contagious laughter going on among them. I still don't know for life of me what had turned them on in this state of 'Satchitanand' (Sanskrit word for 'pure joy of a pure mind') One very simple answer would be that they have a finesse, built in their nature, to improvise in any situation and get maximum out of life with the least they have or get. \*Basti is the Bengali word for slum in Kolkata.



**"Kolkata Cab Driver"**

Desc. : The traffic had come to a grinding halt at the Park Street-chowringhee Intersection and I saw this cab driver from the passenger window of my brother's car, who was driving me around the city. We were cruising, nothing to do on a working day when the rest of the city folks were busting their ass off trying to get to work. My brother had taken some time

off for his big brother visiting after a long time from 'Amerika'. Cars are split by the hairline distance in Kolkata. No car has side-view mirrors. I am totally amazed at how they maintain their hairline space between them with the way that Chaotic traffic moves. He cast a glance at me, my long hair and hippie like looks he despised. To him I was a total jerk with a camera in hand. To me he was a million dollar shot with that face wearing a cynical smile for no good 'idle rich' like me. To him I was too foreign, too white,(even though I am only a shade less brown then he was) too not local, almost too not Indian the way I looked and acted (one finger slightly raised with a pleading look ' May I please take just one picture of you'. No real local person, real Calcuttan would be bothering a working class guy, working real hard to make a living by asking for a picture. I thought he would say to me in the Choicest Hindi to F'off, but he changed his mind at the last second (As always the pristine knowledge of the local lingo came to my rescue as I said 'Jai Ramjiki' Hail The Lord Rama, a regular very important greeting for Hindi speaking 'Biharis' like him). Biharis are to Kolkatans what Mexicans are to the Americans. Biharis migrated to Kolkata, The Mahanagar (the great city) to seek a better living and life. They are Bus Drivers, Cab Drivers, Rickshaw Pullers,House Help, Cooks, Washermen... very hard working, very honest. Yes, he changed his mind and then gave me this expression 'Here take this gift from a working class person like me and remember it as the most precious one you ever got'. Yes the rare gift, the rare picture, the rare face, the rare expression, the rare tolerance, the rare pride, the rare decency, the rare generosity, the rare human dignity

### "Oriyas"

Desc. : Oriyas come from Orissa a state South West of Bengal. They try to stay within their own community even though they speak Bengali very fluently. In Kolkata I have seen them as plumbers, carpenters construction workers,cooks. But one of their major occupation is in Bidi making (also pronounced Biri) a kind of cottage industry. A bidi (from Hindi, pronounced "bee-dee"; also known as biri, beadi, beedie) is a thin, often flavored, Indian cigarette made of tobacco wrapped in a tendu (or temburini; Diospyros melonoxylon roxb.) leaf, and secured with colored thread at one end. Biri is not quite as long as a cigarette. It's perhaps third its size and tenth its price. In a typical Oriya Pan/cigarette/Biri shop you can see them huddled under the counter in little spaces rolling their bidis and then tying them in Bundles and baking them on charcoal fired 'Sigri' or 'Unoon' (a metal bucket pasted with clay on inside and outside, divided by a metal grill, or simply some metal rods at about three quarters height of the bucket. The lower part has a cut out from which coal is filled up in the bucket and then lighted. The metal grill part gets hot with the coal fire burning under. Sigri is also used for cooking by putting a pan or other utensil on the grill} There would be a metal net covering a big sigri on which freshly made bundles of Biris are stacked. They will be baked like this till all the moisture is driven out of the leaf and tobacco wrapped in there. They are very skilled at rolling Biris. One of my childhood memories is watching them rolling one Biri after another with fantastic speed. One late January evening,I saw them, bundled up, seating like this on the sidewalk right next to the shop they work at. It was very cold by their standards-60 F. One of them



smoking a Biri as you can see in the picture (perhaps one of the many they have rolled) I wondered as I was taking this picture that if between them they had rolled over a million Biris in all these years.... years of working silently, skilfully never complaining, never tiring, never in conflict with anyone, always on a natural high with that sparkle in the eyes.



**"Street Vendor-Kolkata, India"**

Desc. : Street Vendor on Park-Circus and Lower Circular road intersection selling a little crystal ball to my sister in the back seat of the cab. (Kolkata India 06) It doesn't get that cold in Kolkata by our standards (I live in Chicago). Low fifties is very cold for Kol folks and since average temperatures for 10 months a year are in Upper eighties to upper nineties, It's a severe temperature difference for them and they would bundle up during December-January. Again if you were a street vendor you literally spend all your time outdoor and would tend to bundle up in terms of clothes. I don't know if he lives well compared to us or not but I do know that behind that scorching sun baked, perfectly brown coloured face lie hidden many stories. He has seen a lot and his face tells you that. I was especially amazed at the focus he had. He didn't even as much as cast a fleeting glance at an expensive looking camera that was almost stuck in his face. All he was interested was in taking care of his customer in the back of the cab. Also, the dignified look he has on his face makes me think that he takes pride in his work. What the picture will of course not give you any idea about is all the noise around, the sheer decibel level of streets like that. To maintain one's focus almost meditatively and stay absolutely unruffled by everything else around is what it takes perhaps to be a successful street vendor. Harsh reality you would think, but I would say 'Such is life' in many parts of the world where people live differently? (to put it euphemistically).



**"The Boats at 'Outram Ghat'"**

Desc. : The river 'Ganges' has countless tributaries that flow throughout the Indian sub-continent. They are known by different names in different regions. In Bengal, the Eastern India, We call it 'Hooghly'. It's wide and has a very strong current. Known for its 'silt deposit' that gives it its 'Yellow Colour', Hooghly flows between the two banks (Eastern side being Kolkata and Western bank the suburbs). The boatmen here take people across the other side by using the current of the river that tends to work in both directions at different times. It's a kamikaze boat ride if you ever took one. Any moment you think the 'Overloaded Boat' will capsize. You better be an excellent swimmer if you plan on taking this boat ride :). The boatmen are a skilled lot. Mostly poor Muslims. This is a fast vanishing mode of transport that's been an important part of Bengal's river culture. One day I am sure they will be replaced by big mechanized ferries.
